Objectives

The purpose of the Erasmus Plus STT week on Academic Writing in Ireland is to foster the advancement of English skills for academic purposes among participants. In the contemporary world the 'publish or perish' academic culture means that it is crucial for academics to use language at an advanced level for the purpose of scientific publication (Scopus®, Web of Science[™], etc.) and the preparation of advanced grant proposals (such as Horizon 2020, Fulbright, etc.).

Programme

The course will run for 5 days (25h) and will also include the option to participate in cultural immersion activities (paid separately) including Irish Cultural Night and a visit to the Guinness Storehouse – the worldfamous 250-year-old former brewery.

Participants

Participants for the seminar workshops should have an English language skill level of CEFR B2 or higher, and be willing to improve their academic English skills. PhD holders, PhD candidates and other academic staff and team members who want to excel in academic publication and academic public speaking are wellwelcome to participate.
